Submissions

Both theoretical and empirical papers are welcome. Preference will be given, conditional on quality, to authors who have not presented in the last meeting. The workshop will include about 10 presentations. The keynote speakers will be **Maria Guadalupe** (INSEAD) and **Uta Schönberg** (University College London).
